“Safeguarding and The Call for Justice - Changing Our World”

Over 100 people attended the annual Diocesan Safeguarding event at St Patrick’s on the 26th September. There is a report on the newly revamped website.



Despite the subject matter, it was a morning of great joy, challenge and hope, with messages such as:

- “Safeguarding is the cornerstone of gospel, a uniqueness of being human, a responsibility for justice and the offer of hope” - Chris Pearson Acting Chair NCSC
- "It’s a story for justice, right at the heart of the gospel message and affects everybody” - Liam Harron Justice and Peace
- "Safeguarding is not bolted on but is vital to the mission of the church" - Judge Michael Murphy, Chair
- "Faith communities have the largest voice, together, to engage with all, for the safety and protection of all” - Munir Hussain, Rotherham Council of Mosques
- "You should make hospitality your special care" - Bishop Ralph, St Paul to the Romans 12:1-2.9-18

Training

There are regular meetings between Safeguarding and Diocesan Caring Services staff, who are now “singing from the same hymn sheet” in trying to promote well being and safety for everyone.

A recent raining session hosted by Lisa Markham helped paid staff in the Hallam Diocese Caring Services - who work in schools and supporting families in difficulty - understand “Towards a Culture of



Safeguarding” and to place their work in the context of the Catholic Church’s endeavours to make sure that safeguarding is understood as integral to **all** ministry.

Useful Resources for Supporting Adults

The Care Act 2014 is a new law about care and support for adults. Over time there have been lots of different bits of legislation and guidance. This Act brings them all together, and places new duties on local authorities and other organisations to promote wellbeing and provide appropriate services as well as more robust safeguarding arrangements. Please also look out for information sessions on Mental Capacity. There is a particular act which supports decision making for people who lack capacity, allows preparation for future decision making and covers people caring for others (**whether professionally or not**). “The Act applies to everyone who looks after, or cares for, someone who lacks capacity – this includes family carers or other carers” Mental Capacity Act Code of Practice. The Year of Mercy

By the time this newsletter reaches you, the Year of Mercy will have been launched officially. A significant number of parishes in the Diocese have experience of supporting offenders through Covenant of Care arrangements. This work is proportionally the fastest growing area of safeguarding “casework”. 11th October was Prisoners Sunday and many of you will have been reflecting on what this means for ministry, and our mission for social justice.

In March, there will be an open event for anyone who is interested: “Understanding Adults who Commit Sexual Offences” and further specific training for Clergy, LSRs and SVP Volunteers who are involved in managing Covenants of Care.
