

Journeying Together THE WORKING DOCUMENT FOR THE SYNOD: SUMMARY AND REVIEW

The

Instrumentum Laboris

, the working document for the two sessions of the XVI ORDINARY GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE SYNOD OF BISHOPS this year and next, was published on June 20th. It is the fruit of the synodal process whichbegan at grass-roots level in local churches (dioceses) in 2021 and continued through national and continental stages. The entire People of God was invited through listening, prayer and discernment to hear what the Holy Spirit was saying to the Church concerning communion, participation, and mission. This working document puts together in a synthetic manner the questions, hopes, dreams, and challenges expressed by Catholics the world over. The whole process showcases how local Churches and the universal Church can work together in fruitful dialogue even when tensions are present.

The 60-page text document is in two main parts, followed by work-sheets suggesting questions and topics to be reflected upon. The first part, church. "For synodal An integral а experience", highlights the contributions made by local churches in the past two years, considers the characteristic signs of a synodal church, and proposes "conversation in the Spirit" as a way forward for this synodal Church. The second part focuses on the three themes of the synodal process -- communion, participation, mission – and presents them in question form as priority issues for the synodal Church:

A communion that radiates: How can we be more fully a sign and instrument of union with God and of the unity of all humanity?

Co-responsibility in Mission: How can we better share gifts and tasks in the service of the Gospel? Participation, governance and authority: What should be the processes, structures and institutions in a missionary synodal Church

The main text of the working document is remarkably short at only 24 pages, while the work sheets, which will prompt most of the reflection and discernment, take up 36 pages. It not a prepared theological text to be is reviewed, emended and voted upon...it presents itself as a "practical aid" (p. 23) "to facilitate discernment on the three priorities that most strongly emerge from the work of all the continents' (IL 14), with a view to identifying the concrete steps to which we feel called by the Holy Spirit in order to grow as a synodal Church." (p. 23) The document thus is open-ended and encourages different viewpoints to emerge without seeking either a pre-determined conclusion or being seen as a questionnaire requiring an answer to every question. In its very structure and way of proceeding, then, the

Instrumentum Laboris reflects

the synodal style now encouraged at all levels of the Church.

The second point to make is how deeply the teaching document reflects the of the 2nd Vatican Council. This is most evident in its emphasis on the centrality of baptism: "A synodal Church is founded on the recognition of a common dignity deriving from Baptism, which makes all who receive it sons and daughters of God, members of the family of God, and therefore brothers and sisters in Christ, inhabited by the one Spirit and sent to fulfil a common mission." (IL 20)

Journeying Together

40th Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes



The 40th Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes took place from 30th June – 6th July 2023, with over 325 people travelling from the Diocese, including a group of 160 Hallam Youth drawn from nearly all our High Schools. The theme chosen by the Sanctuary this year was "

Build a Chapel here

". At our Opening Mass, Bishop Ralph reflected on how St Francis of Assisi thought God was asking him to rebuild the small chapel in San Damiano, but then realised he was in fact being called to help rebuild the Church itself. Throughout the week we reflected on how each of us can " Build the Church

" in the Diocese of Hallam, and each day focused on a specific word from our Pilgrimage Prayer.

Over 50 Volunteer helpers helped look after our Assisted Pilgrims, who needed some form of support during the pilgrimage, and the youth helped push them in wheelchairs. The bond that is formed between our young people and the assisted pilgrims is one of the highlights of our pilgrimage experience.

Our first day was spent travelling, orientation for the youth, and the opportunity for the youth to meet the Assisted Pilgrims. Our first Mass on Saturday morning included the Blessing of the Helpers, and in the afternoon we had our Service of Reconciliation led by Fr Stephen Ssekiwunga. Our diocesan candle was lit that evening in a short ceremony, as we prayed for the Diocese. On Sunday we had the powerful Mass with Anointing of the Sick where Fr. Henry Woodhouse preached the homily. Then Bishop Ralph led the Rosary at the Grotto, pilgrims did the the Stations of the Cross. In the evening we came together to take part in the Torchlight Procession. On Monday morning Bishop Ralph presided at Mass at the Grotto as we joined with the Diocese of Paisley. Hallam Youth went up to the chapel in the Youth Village for their own liturgy in the afternoon, and we came together in the evening for a beautiful Holy Hour, led by Fr. Lee Marshall and young adults from St. Vincent's MissionHub.

On Tuesday, we had Mass in the Rosary Basilica where Bishop John preached on the Theme. In the afternoon we had our Water Liturgy led by Fr. Gus O'Reilly, and then took part as a diocese in the Blessed Sacrament Procession. Tuesday evening we celebrated our 40th pilgrimage with a party.

Wednesday morning saw us participate in the International Mass with 18 Bishops, 160 priests and over 7,000 other pilgrims. We had our Thanksgiving Service Wednesday afternoon and then joined together for our Closing Mass on Thursday morning, where Mgr. Peter Kirkham spoke about the importance of remembering we are part of the Universal Church once we are back home.

Many of the services during the week were livestreamed so that people back in the diocese could join remotely. Those services are now available to watch through the links on our website

, together with a video of the week and the daily reflections recorded by Fr. Lee.

Journeying Together Treading the Pilgrim Path to Padley

Pilgrims from as far away as Loughborough and Oughtibridge gathered at Grindleford Station process to Padley Chapel on 9 July for the annual Hallam and Nottingham Inter-diocesan pilgrimage in honour of our local martyrs Blessed Robert Ludlam and Nicholas Garlick. It was a beautiful day to be in the Peak District for a joyful celebration of Mass in the chapel grounds and in spite of threats the rain held off until the pilgrimage was over.

Bishop Ralph presided over the Mass together with priests from both dioceses. During the homily, Bishop Patrick McKinney of Nottingham shared with pilgrims some of the story of the two heroic local priest martyrs who in July 1588 were discovered and captured whilst staying overnight at Padley Manor. The Fiztherrbert Family who owned the hall, together with the two priests, were arrested and taken to Derby. Two weeks later Blessed Nichols and Robert with another priest Richard Simpson were gruesomely executed in Derby.

An annual pilgrimage honouring the two martyrs began in the late Nineteenth century. The Diocese of Nottingham bought Padley in 1931 and it became part of the Diocese of Hallam in 1980.

Following the Mass, many pilgrims remained behind and were able to sit outside, share their picnics, and enjoy meeting up and chatting. It was also the day before Bishop Ralph celebrated 47 years of his ministry in the Priesthood and 9 years as bishop of Hallam.

Two days later it was the opportunity for the

primary schools to join together in their own pilgrimage. The children and their teachers arrived by a variety of means but the group from St Marie's entered the true spirit of pilgrimage by walking from Mayfield, passing Lady Canning's Plantation and then treading the ancient Roman Road to Padley. Bishop Ralph presided over another joyful celebration of Mass and although the weather drizzly it didn't dampen the spirits of the children who later had the opportunity to have a picnic and explore the ancient chapel and discover something of the story of our local martyrs.


Celebration and Presentation of Certificates for CCRS Students



At the end of long term the students of the Certificate Religious Studies Catholic in accompanied by their families and friends came together for a Liturgy of thanksgiving and a celebration at the Hallam Pastoral Centre on 18 July. During the liturgy two of the students spoke about how valuable the course had been in their faith formation. Margaret Eames spoke how the course had helped her to deepen her understanding of the faith that she had received from her parents. She talked about how when had she passed the 11 plus she had moved to a non-Catholic school and her formal religious education ceased. She went on to say that the course allowed her to ask the questions that she had not been allowed to ask as a young person. He thanked them for their commitment to developing their faith and for sticking with the course which had been interrupted by the Covid pandemic. SeaFarers



"The seafarers had several shopping trolleys filled with fresh fruit and vegetables, bottled water, rice, pasta, and other items when the supermarket manager appeared and said they were not allowed to buy in bulk at this particular branch," said Rev Doug Duncan, Stella Maris north-east Scotland regional port chaplain in Aberdeen.

He explained that because seafarers spend months at sea, when their ship arrives in a port, they often want to stock up in local shops. The manager wouldn't listen, so Doug told the seafarers to leave the trolleys. He took them to a nearby Asda, where they were allowed to buy what they needed.

The irony is that many of the goods sold in supermarkets have been imported and arrive in the UK by ships, not by planes. Around 90% of imports to the UK arrive by ship. This includes items such as coffee and oranges to washing machines and cars.

At one time, seafarers could look forward to time ashore after arriving in a port. But the changes in the shipping industry mean that the time they get ashore is now very short. And some ships never actually dock. Oil tankers, for example, may connect to a pipeline somewhere off shore.

This is where Stella Maris port chaplains such as Doug play such a vital role. They can collect seafarers in the port, drive them to a supermarket, and return them to their ship.

Doug also provided the seafarers, who were on a coaster carrying salt to Aberdeen, with a MiFi unit which enables them to contact loved ones back home. The vessel was to make two trips to Aberdeen over the week, so Doug agreed to leave them the unit and get it back on their last trip.

The idea of spending months at sea in a metal box hundreds or thousands of miles from land and without any way to contact your family back home would not appeal to most of us. But for most seafarers this is the reality of their working life.

There's nothing glamorous about working on a ship. It's a tough and dangerous job where the hours are often long and the pay low. The deck can be slippery, the sea and the wind can be treacherous, and fires on board and collisions with other vessels are common hazards.

Stella Maris port chaplains and volunteer ship visitors are a lifeline for seafarers. In their hard hats and high-vis jackets, they go about their work quietly and without any fuss. When they climb the gangway to a ship the first question they ask the crew is: Can I help you in any way?

They can provide mobile phone top-up cards, internet access (many ships still don't have this), warm clothing in the winter, and transport to local shops. As well as this, they can arrange for Mass to be said on ships or for them to be blessed. This often happens if there has been a death on board.

When a ship arrived at Teesport last year, two Stella Maris ship visitors went on board, taking with them welcome packs and bags of clothing. It transpired that the 22-strong crew was under huge mental and physical strain. One confided that, during the voyage to Teesport from the USA, he had only been getting two hours sleep a night because he was so stressed and overworked. He was also concerned that the crew were no longer able to operate the vessel safely as they were all exhausted.

The Stella Maris team immediately contacted the relevant authorities and a vessel detention notice was served that afternoon. Eleven of the crew were repatriated to the Philippines later that month.

Catholic Union launches campaign to "scrap the cap"

The Catholic Union has launched a major new campaign to lift the 50 percent cap on faith-based admissions to new free schools. People are being asked to sign an open letter to the Education Secretary, Gillian Keegan MP, to "scrap the cap".The letter is available for people to sign on the Catholic Union's website and will be delivered to the Department for Education after the summer holidays.

The 50 percent cap on faith-based admissions applies to oversubscribed free schools with a religious character in England. Introduced by the Coalition Government in 2010, the cap has made it impossible for new Catholic free schools to open as the policy is incompatible with Church law. The Catholic Union, along with the Catholic Education Service and others, has been calling for the policy to be reversed since it was first introduced. The 2017 Conservative manifesto committed to lifting the cap, but this was never achieved.As well as making Catholic education more widely available, the letter to the Education Secretary says that lifting the cap "would help boost morale" in a sector that has struggled with pay and conditions and the pressure of inspections.

Rt Hon Sir Edward Leigh MP, President of the Catholic Union,

comments: "The 50 percent cap is a source of huge frustration to the Catholic community in this country. There has never been any justification for the policy or any evidence to support keeping it in place. I have raised this matter with successive Ministers in the Department for Education. We have come close to getting the cap lifted in the past and with the help of Catholic teachers we can make the Government see sense. Lifting the cap would be a huge vote of confidence in Catholic schools in this country and I know would be welcome by people from other faiths."

Professor John Lydon, Chairman of the **Catholic Union's Education Committee, adds:**


"This letter is a very important initiative from the Catholic Union. There is a bright future for Catholic schools in this country, but we need to be honest about the challenges we face. One of those challenges is the cap on faith-based admissions. It has without doubt restricted access to Catholic education in England and prevented the Church from realising the benefits of the academisation programme currently underway. The letter to the Secretary of State is a timely intervention and I encourage everyone involved in Catholic education in this country to add their name in support."

Water for the Holy Land



The Association Pro Terra Sancta and Friends of the Holy Land Association have recently signed an agreement to install water tanks or solar panels in the houses of families in need in the Bethlehem area. This agreement is part of our year-long cooperation between the two organizations in the social and aid fields. This specific project, named the "Water Emergency & House Rehabilitation Project," aims to improve living conditions, promote sustainability, and provide clean water to people in the Bethlehem area. We aim to help a minimum of 40 households in phase 1 through this project.

FHL is a small ecumenical Christian Charity with groups and supporters across England and Scotland. FHL have been operating for over ten years having been founded in 2009 inspired by a Pilgrimage in 2007, a number of returning Pilgrims felt called to do something to improve the lives of Christians living in the Land that is at the root of their faith.

FHL operates an office in Bethlehem to support vulnerable Christians. In addition to meeting their direct emergency needs, when families fall into financial difficulty, FHL's team in Bethlehem also works with other partner agencies to support vulnerable Christians with medical costs and school fees. Both of which can be very expensive often accounting for as much as a guarter of a normal household's yearly income.Friends of the Holy Land have two major projects in Bethlehem, School of Joy providing education and therapy to disabled children and St Martha's House which is a day centre for elderly women, mainly widows or those whose family have emigrated. FHL also provide long term support to St Luke's Hospital in Nablus, by supporting a medical exemption fund for the local Christian population.
