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Young people see the vibrancy of the church during world Youth day



Hallam Youth joined the 1,000 young people from England and Wales and took part in World Youth Day, Lisbon. We had a few meetings before going but, as the participants were far flung from around the Diocese, I wondered if we would become a group.

As soon as we began our pilgrimage - coming together with young people from every country except 2 in the world - we really came together on our journey as the Diocese of Hallam. Accompanied by Bishop Ralph & Fr Henry Woodhouse, the group took every opportunity given them to immerse themselves into the experience. Here are excerpts from the reflections of two of the pilgrims.

"This year, World Youth Day, took place in Lisbon. I was lucky enough to go and experience this and we went to many different events, this included: the opening mass, the pope's first address, a visit to Fatima, the stations of the cross and the vigil. For me, the most moving event was the vigil. This was when everyone taking part in World Youth Day came to together and camped out for the night. The pope joined us in the evening and gave a speech regarding the theme of WYD: RISE UP. In particular, he spoke about how life is like a journey with its twists and turns and that we might fall down, but that we should remember that Jesus is always there with us helping us to move forward. I thought this a really hopeful message and I found it very powerful thinking that all these young people (around 1.5 million!) will go back to their home country and share with their

parishes and family what they experienced and that ripple effect the world will feel.

During the vigil, there was also adoration, which was a very special moment of prayer we were able to participate in. It was incredible how everyone (I repeat 1.5 million young people!) suddenly went into a serene sort of silence, and it was at that moment that I really thought to myself, wow all these people have come from far and wide for the same exact reason, that is to experience the love Jesus has to offer.

Overall, World Youth Day showed me how alive and thriving the church really is. It was amazing to speak to people from all around the world and hear their experiences knowing we were all united by the same faith. It really was an experience I will be forever grateful for, and I'd like to thank my parents, my parish (St Francis), Sue McDonald, and everyone who has helped me in both fundraising for the event and making this unforgettable pilgrimage happen!"

"In the scorching summer of 2023, I and my pilgrims embarked young transformative journey to World Youth Day, an event that transcended geographical boundaries and united the hearts of millions. As the sun's golden rays bathed the vibrant streets of the host city, I found myself being enveloped in the diverse sea of cultures and languages. Being surrounded by fellow young people from across the globe, made me realise that the Church is truly alive and that there are young saints rising up. Each day brought new spiritual revelations, as I listened to inspiring speakers, participated Holy Masses, and engaged thought-provoking discussions. Amidst the energetic atmosphere, I discovered a profound sense of purpose, which led to me renewing my faith and encouraging me to leave everything at the feet of Christ. This unforgettable experience left an indelible mark on my soul, reminding me of every Catholic's call to holiness and sainthood - a path that is not easy to walk but is certainly worth it."

Previewing the Synod - A historic moment in the life of the Catholic Church



Two years after Pope Francis gave all Catholics the opportunity to make their views known on the mission of the Church in the 21st Century, the first of two Synod meetings will take place in Rome from the 4 October on the theme

'For a Synodal Church: Communion, Participation, Mission'

.

The Synod of Bishops will, for the first time, include non-Bishop voting members, comprising of a number of laymen and laywomen.

The Catholic Church in England and Wales will be well represented. Archbishop John Wilson, the Archbishop of Southwark, and Bishop Marcus Stock, Bishop of Leeds, were elected by their brother bishops to attend. Joining them will be Bishop Nicholas Hudson, an Auxiliary Bishop for the Diocese of Westminster, chosen by Pope Francis, and Professor Anna Rowlands and Austen Ivereigh chosen as expert facilitators. Father Timothy Radcliffe, the Dominican preacher, will lead a retreat for all Synod members prior to the official opening on Wednesday, 4 October.

In a 20-minute conversation linked below, Father Jan Nowotnik, who will attend as a voting member and whose doctoral thesis focused, in part, on the preparation for a Synodal Church, joins theologian Professor Anna Rowlands to preview the Synod. Both will be in Rome, and both will have a key role in proceedings.

John Newton A SCHOLARSHIP programme at an Iraqi Catholic university – which is now entering its second year – is helping the country's beleaguered Christian community stay in their ancient homeland.

The Catholic University in Erbil (CUE), based in the capital of the autonomous Kurdistan region, is providing a scholarship scheme to help Christians and members of other vulnerable groups with support from Catholic charity Aid to the Church in Need (ACN).

Archbishop Bashar Warda of Erbil, the founder of the university, said: "The CUE model encourages the whole family to stay and not to emigrate – their children will have an excellent education to obtain work and therefore a future in Iraq to support themselves and their parents."

Basma Adwar, who was one of the first students to be given financial support to pursue her studies, told ACN "Because I have a scholarship to study, I can stay in Iraq. I want to stay in Iraq. I want my future to be in Iraq, and I want to help build the future of Iraq."

World Mission Sunday 2022: the impact it made



Last year, supporters in England and Wales came together in generosity and faith on World Mission Sunday helping to raise an impressive £616,251.

Supporters in the Diocese of Hallam contributed £9,860.00

to this total

That money went to help missionaries and projects around the world, including the Kidist Mariam Centre in Ethiopia.

Coordinated by Missio, the Pope's charity for world mission, World Mission Sunday is a moment of grace to express solidarity with our brothers and sisters in Christ who are living in situations of poverty, violence, and oppression, through the tireless work of the missionaries who accompany them.

Missio England and Wales invites every parish, school, and community to join this special event, through prayer and giving.

On World Mission Sunday last year, Missio featured the work of Spanish lay missionary Maria in Meki, Ethiopia. As Director of the Kidist Mariam Centre, Maria and her amazing local team work hard to provide a safe, supportive, and educational environment for vulnerable women, so they no longer have to leave their families and communities to find work.

Our Catholic community's generosity and prayers mean that Maria and many other dedicated missionaries like her can keep loving, serving, and sharing God's hope with others.

Maria shared: 'It doesn't matter where we come from, where we live, where we are working... we

are God's dream, and we have to fulfil that dream... So, we have to do our best not only to live out our dream, but also to make real the dreams of so many other people and so many other young women.'

Since last year's World Mission Sunday, thanks to Missio supporters in England and Wales, the Kidist Mariam Centre has continued to provide vocational training, including food preparation, hairdressing, and tailoring, despite the difficulties in Ethiopia at this time.

According to Maria's latest report: 'Conflict and political instability in Ethiopia, the continuing effects of the pandemic, and climate change affecting much of the country are making it increasingly difficult for vulnerable families to have the bare minimum necessary to live. Shortages of food and basic goods in local markets further worsen the situation.

'In September 2022, new students were registered at the Kidist Mariam Centre. The total number of students in May 2023 is 380: 180 students in hairdressing, 163 students in tailoring, 37 in food preparation.'

Missio also shared the story of Beth* who, unable to find employment locally, had travelled overseas and became a domestic worker to help support her family living in Meki. Sadly, her employer abused and exploited her. Watch Beth's story here:

Throughout her darkest moments, Beth shared that her faith was a beacon. She explained: 'I believe that God is always before you and behind you in all your troubles... He is prominent for a person like me, who has fallen in life. He is my life. God is my life and my everything.'

Missio recently received the wonderful news that Beth has now graduated. She shared: 'Missio helped to make it possible...May God make you prosper, may you be measured by the measure you have given... Thank you. God bless you.'

already tested at the 2019 Synod Assembly, part of the remaining CO2 emissions will be offset thanks to projects that will generate a carbon "credit", thus balancing the accumulated "debt."

The project chosen to compensate emissions, which responds to the criterion of integral ecology as proposed by the encyclical *Laudato sì*

, brings together the ecological aspect, attention to the local area and concrete help for the lives of the populations involved. The identified project, implemented in Nigeria and Kenya, aims to disseminate efficient cooking stoves and water purification technologies to households, communities and institutions. The new significantly reduce technologies will the consumption of nonrenewable biomass and fossil fuels for cooking and boiling water. This will result in a significant improvement in air pollution that is directly correlated to respiratory disease and mortality rates, especially among women and children, consequently improving the overall health of the affected populations. The project will use proceeds from the sale of carbon credits to support local partners engaged in the production, distribution and maintenance of the related technologies.

"Never have we so hurt and mistreated our common home as we have in the last two hundred years. Yet we are called to be instruments of God our Father, so that our planet might be what he desired when he created it and correspond with his plan for peace, beauty and fullness." (Pope Francis, LS 53)

Anscombe Centre Draws public Attention to Important Research on Link Between Assisted Suicide & Suicide Rates on World Suicide Prevention Day 2023

Today is World Suicide Prevention Day. On this day in particular, it is an important duty that as a society we examine the potential and actual causes of suicidal ideation, and the best means of preventing suicide.

In the light of that duty and the spirit of this day, we would like to highlight an important paper published last year about the relationship between euthanasia and assisted suicide (EAS) and rates of ('non-assisted') suicide more broadly, as an important contribution to discussions on the dangers of legalising physician involvement in enabling or causing the death of their patients.

World Day of Migrants and Refugees is celebrated by the Church every year on the last Sunday of September. 2023 marks the 109th anniversary of World Day of Migrants and Refugees.

The theme for this years' celebration is 'Free to choose whether to migrate or to stay'.

For many today, migrating is their only choice. Everybody should be able to live their best life and to be able to feel safe and secure - whether in their home country or the place they come to call home.

Sadly our common home is not a place of safety, peace and welcome for all. How can we build our common home together? The Holy Father in his WDMR message says:

Discussion of the synod's instrumentum laboris



The Synod on Synodality, launched in October 2021, is one of the most important initiatives of Pope Francis' pontificate. It also represents the widest process of listening/consultation ever to have taken place across the worldwide Catholic Church. Its purpose – as the word "synod" signifies – is to enable all the members of the Church to learn better how to journey together, a journeying together that seeks to give witness to the mission entrusted to it by the Risen Christ. Through the gift and guidance of the Spirit the whole process seeks to open horizons of hope for the fulfilment of the Church's mission.

Following the first phase of the Synod, namely the diocesan, national and continental synodal consultations over the last two years, a second phase now opens. This consists of two Synodal Assemblies at the international level (October 2023 and October 2024): the aim 'will be to animate the synodal process in the ordinary life

of the Church, identifying which pathways the Spirit invites us to walk along more decisively as one People of God'.

The basis for discussion in the October 2023 Synodal Assembly is the

Instrumentum Laboris

(IL) or Working Paper. The aim and value of this paper is that: firstly, it articulates priorities - 'pathways the Spirit invites us to walk along' - that have emerged in the worldwide listening process; secondly, it presents these priorities not as solutions or decisions, but as questions/paths that require further discernment and action in the years ahead.

What is meant by Communion Participation and Mission?

Communion: Bringing people together as communities in the local Church begins this prayerful insight into the ways of the Holy Spirit. When the Church gathers for the Eucharist, and what flows from it, is when the necessary self-understanding of the mission of the Church is best understood. Thus the dialogue at this level is rooted in the life of the ecclesial communities and parishes.Participation: The reflections that the local Churches are undertaking regarding the past 15 months of pandemic from the context of how the Church in England and Wales looks forward, not backwards, to revitalising its mission of bringing the Good News to all. The gentle invitation to the full practice of Catholic life, with the Eucharist at the centre of all the Church does, is an part integral of the "walking together". Mission: Understanding the local situation will feed necessarily into an overview of the mission in the whole diocese. Like the tesserae of mosaic, the picture is built up of the needs for renewal so that mission to all is firmly rooted in the life of the local community who gather, by the gentle invitation of the Lord, to worship him, to be sanctified by him and to exercise both an individual and collective prophetic voice.

Prisoners' Sunday 8th October 2023 'This day...with me...paradise'

'As President of Pact, I invite you to join with me in supporting Prisoners' Sunday on 8th October 2023. Pact is the national Catholic charity providing support to prisoners and their families. It is good to know that Pact is there for people of all faiths and none, supporting prisoners and their families on our behalf and with our help. I encourage you to play your part in this work of the Gospel for the common good of all.'

Pact posts out a Prisoners' Sunday pack to every parish in England & Wales – arriving around 18th September. It contains a poster, bidding prayers, information about our work and second collection details.

Pact works in four prisons in the diocese, as well as in the community. As part of our work supporting family relationships, we work in the

Pact Visitors' Centres welcoming families arriving to visit a loved one inside, helping them to prepare for their visit and explaining what to expect. This is especially important for the children who can find the prison environment overwhelming.

We organise special Family Visit Days when the normal rules can be relaxed a little. Pact staff and volunteers organised a Family Sports Day recently. Dads wore team T-shirts that their children had coloured in for them. There were Spacehopper races, egg and spoon races, bean bag throwing, an agility course and fairground games like 'hook a duck'.

By organising events like this, Pact can bring some sort of normality to the children's life and dads don't need to miss out on their children's annual sports day or other milestones.

Pact's CEO, Andy Keen-Downs explains, 'Our work in prisons and communities across England & Wales ensures that prisoners, children and families are supported; and their dignity is respected and upheld. Where appropriate we help families to make a fresh start together and live lives which bear good fruit. By supporting prisoners to be restored to the community, our work makes communities safer – research shows that prisoners who have good family relationships are 39% less likely to return to crime.'

Learning through action: Reflection on a visit to Calais



Kirsty, a sixth form student from a Catholic school in Hallam, travelled to Calais last weekend with other young people and teachers. The four-day visit was part of a programme exploring the 'crisis of welcome' for refugees at our borders. It was led by the Columbans and the Diocese of Hallam. She writes:

Before volunteering in Calais, I had an idea of what it would be like: what I would hear, see and learn. These preconceived ideas were mostly incorrect. Because of this, I firstly urge everyone to look into working with refugees - particularly those intending to cross the channel.

"Why would we fight when we've all come here to flee war and conflict?" A common belief is that the camps are full of violence and separation between groups. This is in fact a complete juxtaposition of the truth. I was overwhelmed bγ the camaraderie community spirit all around me. The refugees shared in each other's hopes and aspirations, despite their different beliefs, faiths and nationalities. Before listening to their stories, I didn't understand quite how difficult and long a venture it was. I heard numerous stories of journeys of up to 10 years just to get to Calais, making it abundantly clear that the decision to leave their homes was not made lightly and was out of necessity.
