

Camino Primitivo 2026

. This is the original Camino to Santiago starting from Oviedo in the Spanish province of Asturias. During the 9th century King Alfonso II made the pilgrimage to verify that the remains found in Compostela were indeed those of St James the Apostle. Thus began pilgrimages to Santiago de Compostela with many pilgrims following the footsteps of King Alfonso II. Later during the 11th century the capital moved from Oviedo to Leon establishing a new route which today is call the Camino de Francia. The original route goes over parts of the Cantabrian mountain range and is demanding in parts. Although only 5% of all pilgrims take the route its history and scenery make it a unique experience.

I hope to organise a pilgrimage in September 2026 using this route and looking for 4-6 other pilgrims. The route covers 311 Km or 193 miles which is almost the same as the coast to coast long range walk in this country and takes 16 days. Each person should be experienced in hiking difficult routes through mountain ranges and be of an acceptable level of fitness. At this moment I have no fixed dates or estimation of costs but intend to make enquiries during this September.

CAFOD's Young Leadership programme



At CAFOD, we know that young people can take the lead in creating a better world. Our Young Leadership programme supports young people to be leaders for social justice in their local and global communities.

In Hallam Diocese, CAFOD's Young Leadership programme offers students in Y10 an opportunity to take the lead and make a difference by raising awareness, standing up and speaking out, and giving time and energy to bring about real change in our world. As part of the programme, Young Leaders meet new people, grow in faith and develop confidence, leadership, communication and time management skills.

It has been a joy to journey to with this years 2024-25g group of Young Leaders. They were tasked with sharing the stories of Daniel, Sagesse and Bernadette, our partners in the DRC; whether they wrote the scripts, stood on the stage and delivered, or prepared and ran a PowerPoint presentation. Some students visited their local primary schools to raise awareness about CAFOD, others delivered to year groups in their schools. At St Pius X, one of the things the students loved was, 'That we were all more confident at presenting assemblies to students in all Year groups, even the Year 11s'.

All schools have fundraised in different ways; St Pius X students organised bake sales, flowers and gifts for Mother's day. All Saints students encouraged each form group to raise money for World Gifts. St Bernard's organised a Lenten soup lunch, so successful they repeated it the following day. Notre Dame took part in CAFOD's Big Lent Walk, walking 8 miles from Notre Dame High School to Padley Chapel.

The Young Leaders were also tasked to raise awareness of CAFOD's Cancel Debt, Choose Hope campaign, encouraging their peers to call for a reset of the unjust debt crisis.

We are grateful to all the Young Leaders, the Staff Accompaniers, the school communities, friends and families for their support for our global family, through praying, campaigning and giving. The Holy Family Parish Pilgrimage to Padley Chapel



On Saturday, 18th July 2025, Holy Family parishioners travelled to Grindleford, for their parish Jubilee pilgrimage to the Padley Martyrs' Shrine. Most participants began their journey with a 14 minute train ride from Sheffield Station to Grindleford station, High Peak District in Derbyshire where Padley Chapel is situated within walking distance of the train station. Visitors of all ages were welcomed by the 'Friends of Padley', who look after and maintain this site as a part of our Catholic cultural heritage. After arrival, attendees listened to talks about the history of Padley, it's Martyrs, the Blesseds Nicholas Garlick and Robert Ludlum, and the challenges faced by other local Catholic families regarding their faith during their time. The visit coincided with the same month that the Martyrs were arrested, imprisoned and finally executed on the 24th of July 1588 on Saint

Mary's Bridge Derby.

A central component of the pilgrimage was the by Father celebration of mass Woodhouse inside the chapel, with liturgy and hymns delivered in various languages reflecting the diverse national backgrounds within the Holy Family Catholic Parish in Sheffield. Some Catholic friends from Manchester happened to be visiting the area, were also lucky to be present for the mass. Following mass, attendees enjoyed refreshments and a light lunch in the courtyard of Padley in true Holy Family style.

Little Pilgrimage for the Jubilee Season of Creation



There has been a regular Mass for many years on the first Monday of the month at St. Michael's Rivelin, offered for the souls of those buried there and in the Catholic section of Crookes Cemetery.

The Chapel and the cemetery are beautiful, in lovely wooded surroundings that reach up the valleyside through the trees to join Walkley Cemetery. This September the date for the Mass fell on the first day of the Season of Creation,

and it seemed a fitting opportunity both to offer prayers for those gone before, and to celebrate the beauty of the natural world around their resting place.

A new Mass for the Care of Creation was instituted by the Vatican this summer, and offered by Pope Leo in the Borgo Laudato Si', Castel Gandolfo, in July. Fr Paddy Walsh used the new Liturgy for his last Mass at St. Michael's as parish priest, to celebrate the Season of Creation.

Afterwards, a group of us from Sacred Heart, St. William of York, St. Vincent's and the Cathedral, walked along the Rivelin Valley Trail to Malin Bridge, with prayer stops along the way dedicated to the industry carried out along the river in years gone by, and to conservation work undertaken now to maintain its heritage and biodiversity, for today and for generations to come. At Malin Bridge we remembered the death and destruction caused by the Great Sheffield Flood of 1864, and we prayed for those caught in terrible floods today and those threatened by rising sea levels due to climate change. From there we walked on to Sacred Heart, Hillsborough, where Father Michael Umameh said a final prayer with us in the Memorial Garden. A Little Pilgrimage for the Columba Timmins. lubilee Year. 2025 Jubilee Year Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes



The phrase "A Pilgrimage isn't meant to be easy" is one that I've heard many times over the 38

years that I've been travelling on pilgrimage to Lourdes with the Diocese of Hallam. This was certainly demonstrated when 335 pilgrims from around the diocese, including 166 in the "Hallam Youth group" with students from all 7 diocesan High Schools, participated in the Jubilee Year Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes from 27th June to 3rd July 2025.

Pilgrims on the Charter Flight endured two separate delays – an initial 2½ delay due to crew hours and then a further 5 hours delay after the aircraft hit the windscreen on landing at Leeds Bradford Airport.

The spirit in which pilgrims navigated this 7½ delay was incredible with volunteer helpers, doctors and nurses, making sure our Assisted Pilgrims were looked after, and with many pilgrims using the time to get to know one another better.

Pilgrims gathered together for the Opening Mass on Saturday 28th June, our diocesan patronal feast day, with Mass celebrated by Bishop Ralph, and a powerful homily from Bishop Emeritus John Rawsthorne on the cure of Jack Traynor (71st recognized miracle of Lourdes). Traditionally, this was the Mass with "Blessing of the Helpers" where pilgrimage volunteers came forward to have their hands blessed. This year, in order to fully recognise that each and every one of us helps other pilgrimage, all pilgrims were invited to have their hands blessed.

On Saturday afternoon we had our Service of Reconciliation with large numbers of people going to confession. Saturday evening we participated as a Diocese in the Torchlight Procession, and then on Sunday morning we had our Mass with Anointing of the Sick.

We adapted the pace of our pilgrimage as the temperatures in Lourdes reached 35° C/ 36° C but still managed to hold a short Jubilee Procession on Sunday afternoon with our Diocesan Candle, from the Crowned Virgin

Statute to the Chapel of Lights, complete with Jubilee Flags for pilgrims celebrating the Jubilee Year. We participated in the Blessed Sacrament Procession and pilgrims had the opportunity for a late night visit to the Grotto for quiet prayer late on Sunday evening.

On Monday 30th June we joined with the Diocese of Paisley for Mass at the Grotto before heading up to the Lac de Lourdes to gather together socially, as a Diocese.

One of the highlights for many pilgrims is Holy Hour, which was led by Fr Lee Marshall on Monday evening. Other liturgies during out time in Lourdes included Stations of the Cross and participation in the International Mass on Wednesday morning and our Closing Liturgy on Wednesday afternoon. On Thursday morning, we split into three hotel groups for Mass in different chapels – celebrated by the priest chaplain from each hotel.

We were aware that there was going to be an Air Traffic Control strike on 3rd and 4th July but were initially advised by the airport that our departure would be ok. Sadly, just as we were checking-in at the airport, the authorities cancelled the flight and all our pilgrims returned to their hotels, within the hour. We ended up spending an extra 48 hours in Lourdes – which after the initial inconvenience, proved to be an extra blessing for many. We finally landed back on the evening of Saturday 5th July!

Caritas News



Janet Kent, senior manager at Caritas, was invited to facilitate a workshop at the conference Catholic Social Teaching on the Streets at Oxford University on 2 September, the event was organised by the Charles Plater Trust.

Janet worked alongside Dr Amy Daughton Associate Professor in Practical Theology to explore the relationship between Catholic Social Teaching and the work of the Carmel Care Centre in Sheffield.

Janet said ' It was a joy and a privilege to take part in such an interesting and inspiring event.

Please see below a summary of the workshop.

Cultures of Encounter at Carmel Care:

Rejecting the isolation of abuse

This session focused on the work of the Carmel Care Centre, a team who work with people who've experienced coercion and abuse, to help them in recovery and regrowth.

This case study offered an example of a culture of encounter where encounter becomes the culture: "a project that includes everyone" (Fratelli Tutti, §216).

By discussing the activities and experiences of those who work and learn at Carmel Care, this session aimed to explore a culture of encounter and how it is sustained: where dignity goes beyond mere subsistence; where flourishing means giving as well as receiving; and where this project of the common good becomes a path to hope. Carmel Care illuminates the hope

of what a culture of encounter can be like, and how it can be built.- **Janet Kent** for Caritas

March for Life 2025



On Saturday 6th September, the day began at 7:30am, as a group of 'Pilgrims of Hope' from across the diocese of Hallam travelled down by coach to the annual March for Life event in London. Groups from different dioceses, all over England, travelled to this event to witness to their pro-life beliefs. Seven Catholic Bishops join the record-breaking UK March for Life, in which it is estimated 10,000 participants took part, and for the first time, a message and apostolic blessing to all participants from the Holy Father, Pope Leo XIV. The theme for this year was #HumanRights4All.

The day started at 10:30am in the Emmanuel Centre with a host of empowering pro-life speakers such as Heidi Crowter, a Down Syndrome advocate, speaking about human rights being denied for certain disabilities and that all individuals have the right to be different. There were live interviews with women affected by abortion talking about what women are not told about abortion. A heart-moving testimony from Josiah Presley, an abortion survivor, whose life has been physically and emotionally impacted due to the attempt to end his life in the womb. A Q&A session with legal experts on Human Rights and the Law. An empowering, bold yet resounding compassionate talk from MP Carla Lockhart who called for all leaders in power to recognise the dignity of both the woman and the unborn child. In addition to these distinguished pro-life speakers, this is a family-friendly event which provided crafts, face

painting and a play area for the younger children, and there were pro-life talks and the opportunity to create a pro-life T-shirt for the older children.


The March began at 1:30pm at the Emmanuel Centre, close to Westminster Cathedral, and culminated in Parliament Square. The March is the epitome of the event. Many people united in one belief that God is the giver and creator of all life and abortion is gravely wrong. A bagpipe player led the march, as we proceeded through the streets of London, with banners and placards held aloft and all that could be heard pro-life chants, prayers and hymns ascending heavenward. By walking along the streets of our capital, and in particular, assembling in front of the Houses of Parliament, we demonstrated our support for measures which protect life before those who make our laws. The March felt especially pertinent this year, with Leadbeater's Assisted Suicide Bill facing its second reading in the House of Lords on 12th September and the proposal in the Crime and Policing Bill to decriminalise abortion, also set to be debated in the Lord's soon after. **Rachel Wood**

The welcome we received at the Parish of Corpus Christi, the Cathedral Church of St Marie's and Padley Chapel was simply outstanding.

Saint Mark's Way offered us all the opportunity to participate in one single collective prayer. It involved route planning, connecting Dioceses, parish welcomes, visiting spiritual sites that 'bridged time', saying the Angelus and the Rosary along the Way and ultimately being blessed with the celebration of the holy Mass.

This information will support our assessment of the effectiveness of current safeguarding arrangements and contribute to the prevention of abuse. Whatever you tell us will help inform our conclusions about safeguarding today. We will let you know exactly how we will manage the information you give us.

St William of York –A Birthday Bash!



On Sunday 24 August, St William's celebrated the 90th birthday with one of their musicians, Jackie Williams; with cake and African drumming. Always one to champion everyone to 'have a go', this was an all-age party enjoying a new way of making a joyful noise.

I never believed I would celebrate my 90 birthday in the Catholic Church, but here I am after being received and confirmed in 2023. God still has work for me to do and I intend to live this out. Slower than before, but still running the race with perseverance!

My arrival in St William's has been a journey of faith, prayer and music. Baptised in Sheffield 1935, into an Anglican family; I am a multi-instrumentalist, - my main instruments are flute and Piano, although I no longer play flute.

I studied music at Manchester and Reading in the 1950's and experienced incredible opportunities playing flute alongside well-known musicians, with Royal Liverpool Philharmonic Orchestra and Sir John Barbirolli. I acquired a wealth of Conducting knowledge from the Professor - skills I would use throughout my career. Having wanted to be an orchestral player, I discovered early on, that life was not for me.

Returning to Sheffield as Head of Music at Grange Grammar School, it was wonderful to encourage girls to fulfil their musical ambition. Alongside teaching, I wrote and arranged music; as well as playing in several Sheffield Orchestras. I was also had my first choir: The Youth Squash Choir – a vibrant group of young people who came together to sing and express their faith.

After the arrival of comprehensive education, I retired from classroom teaching but continued instrumental teaching for a while, but I found it was restrictive in creativity. Having been a Sunday School teacher, I became a Church Leader in the Housechurch. Prayer is and remains at my core and God was showing me the next steps on my journey.

Approached by Kingsway Music I proofed arrangements and typeset the early Songs of Fellowship books. I began my music publishing business – JAW Music, writing arrangements for experienced and beginner musicians to be used in churches. Interdenominational churches across the globe were now requesting copies. JAW Music ran until I was 70 and the ownership was transferred.

Billy Graham visited Sheffield in 1985, and I trained the choirs of over 500 in the North. At the Mission I was privileged to be asked to conduct my arrangements.

Afterwards, the Sheffield section carried on and became The Celebration Choir with 300 members. We proclaimed the gospel through song around the UK and it was one of the highlights of my Christian witness in music, releasing several recordings.

In 1998 bowel cancer arrived and I had to step away from music. Every fibre of strength was devoted to prayer and survival. After a gruelling two years of operations/chemotherapy, I was cancer free and back conducting.

There is a time for everything and a season for every activity and after 27 years it was time. Aged 75 I relinquished my role as church leader and musical director.

Before lockdown, I was invited to Mass at St William's. God was guiding me, and I was transfixed with the reverence afforded to the Body and Blood of Christ. My prayer life widened, I feel immediate peace wash over me when I partake in the sacrament.

Been given a talent of music, I am now one of the organists/musicians. God always finds an opportunity for the willing servant. I still write occasional arrangements and I know this is where I am meant to be. I am still learning, praying and listening to what God wants me to do. We never know where we will be called to serve! A Milestone for Hospice Care in the Holy Land



Bethlehem, September 2025 — Last Month marked the second anniversary of the Bethlehem Care and Hospice Trust's Hospice at Home service—the only licensed palliative care provider in the Occupied Palestinian Territories (OPT).

The initiative was launched on 1 August 2023 in response to an urgent request from the Christian community in Bethlehem, a city with the highest reported incidence of cancer in the OPT. Alarmingly, 7 out of every 10 cancer diagnoses in the region come too late for curative treatment. Before the service began, palliative care simply wasn't available—leaving many to face terminal illness without the dignity or comfort of appropriate care.

Unable to fund a dedicated hospice facility, the Trust instead developed a home-based care model. A solid operational structure was quickly established in Bethlehem, including an Operations Board supported by Clinical and Financial Governance Committees. Licenses were obtained, medical staff were recruited and trained, and the service officially launched.

Just two months after opening, (October 7 2023), the socio-economic and security environment deteriorated significantly. The OPT essentially shut down—tourism halted, businesses closed, and already high poverty levels worsened. In a region where nearly 30% of people survive on less than £1.34 a day, unemployment soared. Restrictions on movement added another layer of difficulty to delivering healthcare.

Despite these immense challenges, the Hospice at Home service persisted. Beginning with just 11 patients, the team of dedicated nurses have since made over 3,200 home visits, caring for 227 patients and supporting their families during their most difficult times.

Now entering its third year, the service is currently supporting 95 patients and continues to build compassionate communities across the Bethlehem Governorate. But the need is still far greater than the service's current capacity.

"We know there are many more suffering without access to palliative care—not just in Bethlehem, but throughout the OPT," a spokesperson for the Trust said. "We urgently need financial support to expand our services and reach those who are still going without care."

She Spiritual Exercises of St Ignatius of Loyola Made in daily life



What are the Spiritual Exercises?

In the 16th century, St Ignatius of Loyola set out his 'Spiritual Exercises' – sharing the way he had found to God. Initially these were offered as a 30 day silent retreat. Since that time, this way has become hugely influential – promoting a way to God based on everyday life. This retreat is at the heart of Jesuit Spirituality - the Jesuits today being the largest Catholic Order of priests and religious. Jesuits undertake the Spiritual Exercises twice during their formation and entry into the Society of Jesus, once at the beginning and again at a later stage.

More recently the Jesuits have promoted a wider use of the Exercises. From about the 1980s, the Exercises have been offered to a growing number of lay people and others from different Christian traditions. The most common way for laypersons to go through the Exercises now is through a "retreat in daily life", a five-seven months programme of prayer and reflection made in ordinary life. This form of the Exercises Ignatius called the 19th Annotation and is the form on offer here.

What is undoubted is the influence the Exercises can have. Many people have found undertaking the Spiritual Exercises to be life-changing, getting to know Jesus in a new and intimate way while providing fresh purpose to their lives.

Who is this for?

No special experience is necessary – simply the desire to know God more deeply, to find my purpose more clearly. However, the undertaking is a substantial one, requiring time and an openness to prayer.

For this reason, there is an 'introductory time' – time to allow an informed decision before a commitment to the retreat as a whole. The programme starts with four introductory weeks to see if this is for me - [1-22October].



British Federation of Notre Dame (de Namur) Associations, (BFNDA)



Be like the sunflower that follows every movement of the sun, and keep your eyes always turned towards our good God," St. Julie Billiart

The British Federation of Notre Dame (de Namur) Associations (BFNDA), allies associations of past pupils, students, staff and anyone else connected with Notre Dame schools, or colleges, from around the country. St. Julie Billiart formed the Notre Dame order in 1804 to educate the daughters of the poor. Some schools have now closed. Some have merged with similar organisations to form new establishments, (e.g. Mount Pleasant College of Education, with two other colleges, became Liverpool Hope University). Others, are flourishing, still with the Notre Dame ethos and badge with St. Julie's words "Ah, qu'il est bon, le bon Dieu" ("Ah, how good he is, the good God") and also educate boys.

BFNDA was formed in 1928 to bring together past pupils, "for mutual assistance", "for the furtherance of Catholic education and interests", "to formulate and promote movements requiring the support of educated Catholic women" and "the welfare of Notre Dame (de Namur)".

The current federation has an annual "Weekend Away", in September, including an AGM, prioritising the social aspects of the meeting, e.g. an optional trip to a local place of interest (including coffee & cake) a delicious dinner, with a highly entertaining speaker and the opportunity to meet old friends and colleagues and form new friendships with people from elsewhere. A very important aspect of the organization is the support it has given and continues to give to Notre Dame projects around the world.

The sisters have communities, dedicated to helping in under-privileged and frequently dangerous areas. There are projects which bring basic commodities, such as fresh water to very poor areas and education to girls (and boys), often where there is violent opposition. The achievements of alumni groups which support the missionary work of the Notre Dame order and fulfill the aims of St. Julie Billiart are greatly enhanced when working in co-

Book Review

John Curr: The Man Who Revolutionised Mining, by Charles P Dixon

published by Heritage Hunter, www.heritagehunter.co.uk, price £25.

Walk through the South Door of St Marie's Cathedral in Sheffield and you will see a small notice telling you that, somewhere under the modern flooring, lies the tombstone of one John Curr.

It is a brief reminder of a man who - though little known today - has his place alongside some of the great names of the Industrial Revolution in addition to the Catholic Revival's impact on the Sheffield region.

Now, thanks to Charles P Dixon, one of Curr's direct descendants, his place as 'The Man who Revolutionised Mining' is assured, alongside his legacy as one of those who laid the foundations on which Sheffield's Catholic Cathedral is built. For Catholics, Curr was the leader of three men who acquired land from the then Duke of Norfolk in 1814 where the first public place of Catholic worship in Sheffield was built since Henry VIII's Reformation made Catholicism illegal.
